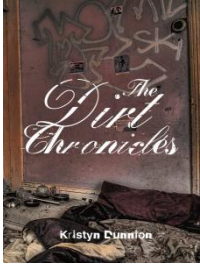

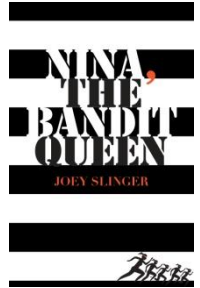


🍁 **The Dirt Chronicles**

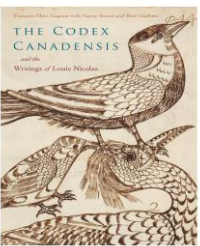


🍁 **Nina, The Bandit Queen**

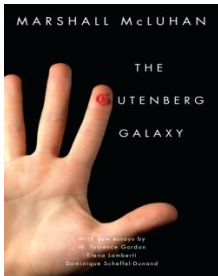


🍁 **The Codex Canadensis**

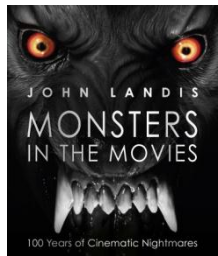


🍁 **The Gutenberg Galaxy**

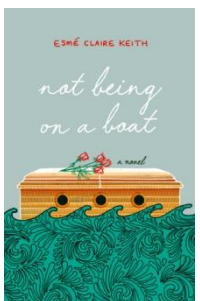


Monsters in the Movies

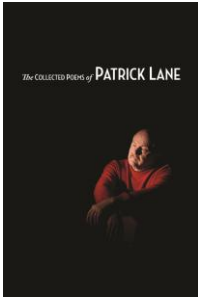


🍁 **Not Being on a Boat**
