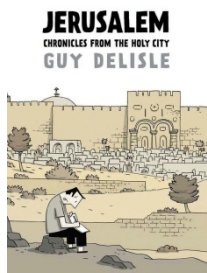

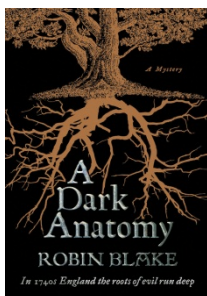


Jerusalem Chronicles From the Holy City

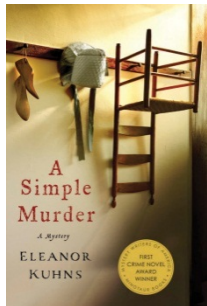


A Dark Anatomy

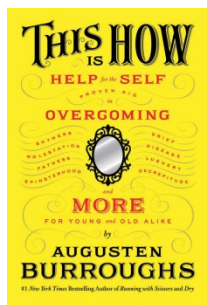


A Simple Murder
