PUBLISHER'S LETTER

n the world of letters, Spring lists herald a new publishing year. This is even truer than usual for URP in 2025, which comprises many firsts for us. Yet this season is marked, too, by a profound engagement with marginalized peoples' long history of resistance. In this way, Spring 2025, for all its novelty, upholds the historic values and aspirations of our lists.

First, continuity may be found in Kelly Shepherd's Dog and Moon, the 19th of our Oskana poetry collections, one that eloquently extends that series' concern for the natural world in the fraught context of the Anthropocene. Renewal comes, though, in the launch of two new scholarly series. Amazigh Cinema marks the debut of the Indigenous Voices in World Arts and Cultural Expressions series. Bringing together work by international scholars, this volume celebrates the cinematic achievement of the Indigenous peoples of North Africa and details how it's helped preserve Amazigh identity in the face of historical repression. Marie Carter's monograph, In the Light of Dawn, is the first entry in our Henry and Mary Bibb series in Black Canadian Studies. Relating the history of the Dawn Settlement of Dresden, Ontario, Carter canvasses more than 200 years of cultural flourishing, from the days of slavery that brought

the settlement's residents north to a present indebted to the contributions of this vital Black community.

URP is excited by these series and by their taking our long-standing commitment to social justice scholarship and Indigenous voices in new directions. As regards the latter, though, these titles are not the spring's only instances of novelty. Showcasing the work of Indigenous graduate students, Stitching Our Stories Together, edited by Jeannine Carriere and Catherine Richardson, foregrounds emerging scholars and a commitment to making Indigenous ways of knowing core to Canadian higher learning. Governor General's award-winning scholar, writer, and visual artist. David Garneau, is no newcomer to the Canadian academic or art scene. However, his Dark *Chapters* represents another first for URP. Here, some of the country's most accomplished poets, storytellers, and scholars respond to Garneau's latest visual meditations on the impact of colonial education and culture on Indigenous identity; the result is a book we are honoured to be able to share.

Our Spring list ranges beyond the contemporary Canadian milieu, however. While Youcef Soufi's *Homegrown Radicals* tells a story that begins on the Prairies, its tale of state surveillance, youth radicalization, communal injury, and ideological warfare reaches beyond Winnipeg to encompass both the follies of Ottawa and the tragedies of the Middle East. Finally, Ben Brisbois's *Banana Capital* traces the often-catastrophic impact of pesticide use and corporate agendas on workers in the Ecuadorean banana industry, charting a Latin American history of repression and resistance resonant with those found elsewhere in this Spring's list.

This is a catalogue, then, filled with exciting new developments, tales of global reach and local resonance, and work committed to amplifying the voices of those whose aim is the achievement of a juster future born of a present mindful of what the past has to teach.



Homegrown Radicals

A Story of State Violence, Islamophobia, and Jihad in the Post-9/11 World


An unflinching examination of the state violence that created and indelibly tied together the fates of homegrown radical and moderate Muslims in the post-9/11 era

n the shadow of 9/11, Canada saw the emergence of the figure of the homegrown radical Muslim, raising fears and worries about the possibility of an enemy capable of harming and destabilizing the nationstate. In contrast stood the moderate Muslim, who represented the possibility of national unity despite religious and racial differences.

Homegrown Radicals brings these two figures together in uneasy tension, exploring the radicalization of three Muslim students from the Canadian Prairies and tracing North American Muslims' general sense of affective injury over the loss of Muslim life in military campaigns overseas.

Lifting the veil from the experiences of Canadian Muslims during the War on Terror, this book examines the violence that produced a new discourse of jihad, legitimated state surveillance, and sanctioned Islamophobia. It is an effort to understand the forms of empathy and solidarity that North American Muslims had to offer in creating a different and kinder world, if only the state had listened.

YOUCEF SOUFI is a Researcher in Islamophobia with the Centre for Human Rights Research at the University of Manitoba and former Chair of the Canadian Association for the Study of Islam and Muslims. He is an expert in the history of Islamic law and author of *The Rise of Critical Islam:* 10th-13th Century Legal Debate.



Dark Chapters

Reading the Still Lives of David Garneau curated by Arin Fay, edited by Nic Wilson

A singular collection of creative responses to the still life paintings of acclaimed artist David Garneau

ark Chapters brings together 17 poets, fiction writers, curators, and critics to engage with the works of David Garneau, the Governor General's Award-winning Métis artist. Featuring paintings from Garneau's still life series "Dark Chapters" alongside poetry, fiction, critical analysis, and autotheory, the book includes contributions from Fred Wah, Paul Seesequasis, Jesse Wente, Lillian Allen, Billy-Ray Belcourt, Larissa Lai, Susan Musgrave, and more.

A nod to the Reports of Truth and Reconciliation Commission, in which Justice Murray Sinclair describes the residential school system as "one of the darkest, most troubling chapters in our nation's history," Garneau's still life paintings combine common objects (books, bones, teacups, mirrors) and less familiar ones (a Métis sash, a stone hammer, a braid of sweetgrass) to reflect the complexity of contemporary Indigenous experiences.

Rooted in Garneau's life-long engagement at the intersections of visual art and writing, *Dark Chapters* presents a multifaceted reflection on the work of an inimitable, unparalleled artist.

Based on Treaty 4 lands, Saskatchewan, DAVID GARNEAU is one of Canada's foremost Métis artists, painters, and public intellectuals, who has been leading the charge in complex conversations around the nuances of Métis identity and the politics of Indigeneity, Indigenization, and non-colonial aesthetics in the colonized lands of Canada.

ARIN FAY is currently the Curator at the Nelson Museum, Archives and Gallery (NMAG) and lives near Kaslo, British Columbia.

NIC WILSON (they/he) is an artist and writer whose work often engages time, queer lineage, decay, and the distance between art practice and literature.



In the Light of Dawn

The History and Legacy of a Black Canadian Community

Illuminating two hundred years of lost Black history through the lens of an iconic abolitionist settlement

n the Light of Dawn shares the compelling story of how the iconic Dawn Settlement—now largely within the boundaries of Dresden, Ontario shaped (and was shaped by) a broader course of international events along a 200-year continuum of resistance and contribution. Using a geographic approach, the book reveals that the town's size, scope, and importance eclipses its previous narrow interpretations as a "failed" utopian colony at a terminus of the Underground Railroad led by the Reverend Josiah Henson (the "real Uncle Tom" of Harriet Beecher Stowe's landmark anti-slavery novel).

Beyond Henson, Dawn's history contains familiar figures like Frederick Douglass and Rosa Parks as well as a pantheon of lesser known but equally important Black leaders including Dennis Hill, William Whipper, William Carter, and Hugh Burnett. The trajectories of Dawn's residents often intersect with pivotal international events from the time of the fur trade to the modern Civil Rights movement. Activism from 19th-century Pennsylvania's Black Elite and other major American centres run like a golden thread through successive generations in Dawn, resulting in landmark actions such as the challenge to segregation of private businesses and publicly funded schools. Dawn's people not only resisted slavery and oppression but also made successful and lasting contributions to the growth of local communities and wider society.

Far from being a failed colony, the Dawn Settlement emerges as a vibrant community of racial and economic diversity, where people of agency and ability influenced wider societal change. *In the Light of Dawn* presents an expansive yet nuanced account of a small rural town that challenges traditional notions of Black History and the contributions of early Black pioneers, leaving behind an enduring legacy.

MARIE CARTER is a lifelong resident of Dresden, Ontario, where she researches and writes about the history of her community, the former Dawn Settlement area. Her eclectic career has included graphic artist, reporter-photographer for community newspapers and church press, and rural organizer of outreach to migrant agricultural workers.



An introduction to North African Indigenous cinema through a new understanding of the Amazigh homelands


mazigh Cinema: An Introduction to North African Indigenous Film examines the emergence of Amazigh visual media in its historical and cultural contexts and engages in a decolonization of the studies of Amazigh expression. An exploration of film from across the Tamazgha or Amazigh homelands produced by and about Imazighen, Indigenous peoples historically referred to as "Berbers," the book underscores the role of cinematic art in language preservation and the shaping of contemporary Amazigh identity against a backdrop of historical repression and exclusion.

Opening up debate on the growing archive of Amazigh cinema for global audiences, this collection contrasts Amazigh production with national and global cinema and traces links between oral performance, amateur video, and feature films. These films expose fault lines in post-colonial belief systems and interrogate the tension between the pull of nostalgia and push for change as filmmakers use their cameras to re-establish a sense of presence and continuity in a changing world.

Resisting folklorization, *Amazigh Cinema* shows how Amazigh filmmakers engage multiple spectatorships in the everyday lives of rural and immigrant people who have overcome discrimination and cultural apathy using the ancient methods and modern tools at hand. Their use of visual mediums to craft new narratives of Amazigh life creates a space for all audiences to witness Indigenous lives and their strategies—and celebration—of survival.

LUCY R. MCNAIR is a literary translator of French and Professor of English at LaGuardia Community College, City University of New York. Her translations include the classic Algerian coming-of-age novel, *The Poor Man's Son*, by Amazigh writer Mouloud Feraoun, the memoir *To Hell and Back* by Samira Bellil, and many critical studies, creative essays, and poems by North African writers. She co-curates the New York Forum of Amazigh Film.

YAHYA LAAYOUNI is Associate Professor of Arabic Studies and French at the Commonwealth University of Pennsylvania. He is an Amazigh native of Morocco and co-organizer of the New York Forum of Amazigh Film. His work on Amazigh Indigenous and Franco-Maghrebi cinema has appeared in the Journal of Religion and Film, The Bloomsbury Handbook of Muslim Popular Culture, and Jadaliyya.

Banana Capital Stories, Science, and Poison at the Equator


Explores the far-reaching impacts of pesticides in Ecuador's banana industry, tracing their roots through more than a century of history in the banana-producing Americas

t the southern end of Ecuador's *la costa* region lies the city of Machala, the self-described "Banana Capital" of the world. There, farmers and workers experience alarming health effects associated with widespread pesticide use in banana production, compounded by precarious and unsafe working conditions. *Banana Capital: Stories, Science, and Poison at the Equator* reveals the often grim realities of daily life in banana-producing parts of the world and, beyond that, seeks to understand and address these challenges.

Ben Brisbois's search for solutions leads him back to the 19th-century origins of banana production in the Americas and through over a century of imperialism, bloodshed, ecological devastation, diverse workforces, and not-so-diverse bananas. Along the way, however, attempts by powerful Northern corporations and their government allies to extract wealth from Latin American territories and bodies prove vulnerable when met with resistance mounted by workers, Latin American nations, and the ever-unpredictable natural world.

Banana Capital issues an urgent call to action, unveiling the power dynamics of life in the banana industry—dynamics vividly experienced by workers in ways that are rooted in significant relationships to communities, the land, and neocolonial power structures. Ultimately, the book provides a roadmap toward social justice and sustainability in the uncertain future of banana production.

BEN BRISBOIS is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Social and Preventive Medicine of the Université de Montréal's School of Public Health. He lives in Montreal.

etween its covers, *Stitching Our Stories Together* highlights the research of Indigenous graduate students from universities across Canada. Focusing on their own nations, communities, and individual realities, these academics demonstrate how Indigenous epistemologies can challenge settler ideas and myths around pan-Indigeneity.

This collection is bookended with reflections from the scholars' thesis supervisors, who describe their philosophy of mentoring and supporting students through an Indigenous lens, and how their pedagogies embrace the significance of relationality in Indigenous worldviews.

By celebrating the work of Indigenous researchers, *Stitching Our Stories Together* points toward a future where Indigenous ways of knowing and being take their rightful place in the halls of higher learning and beyond.

JEANNINE CARRIERE identifies as Red River Métis and has focused her academic scholarship on Indigenous child and family services. She was formerly a Professor at the School of Social Work at the University of Victoria.

CATHERINE RICHARDSON is a Métis professor and Director of the Concordia University First Peoples Studies Program. She is a registered clinical counsellor whose research focuses on Indigenous well-being, social service delivery, and recovery from interpersonal and systemic violence.

Time moves differently depending on your bedsprings. From a net of clouds, the moon:


so much of writing is trying to remember your thoughts from other states of consciousness.

oven together from fragments collected in notebooks and dream journals over two decades of introspection, *Dog and Moon* inhabits a space of sleeplessness, enveloped in the darkness of night. Kelly Shepherd draws inspiration from the free-verse ghazal but takes the form and bends it to create a sort of Indra's Net, with couplets echoing and reflecting across his poems. They are a series of juxtapositions: nature writing placed in conversation with the language of poetry workshops, mythology and childhood memories, and sensorial encounters with the natural world colliding with images of home and belonging.

KELLY SHEPHERD is a poetry editor for the *Trumpeter*. His second poetry collection, *Insomnia Bird*, won the 2019 Robert Kroetsch City of Edmonton Book Prize. Originally from Smithers, British Columbia, he lives and teaches on Treaty 6 territory in Edmonton.
