Where the Eff is My Red Tent is a visceral, unflinching memoir-in-essays about what happens when a person grows up believing their suffering is just part of life. For decades, Heather Hendrie lived in a body and mind she couldn't quite trust. Each month, like clockwork, a storm rolled in—one of despair, self-doubt, and disconnection. Doctors dismissed it. Culture normalized it. She believed it was her fault. It wasn't.

Told with startling clarity and lyrical precision, *Where the Eff is My Red Tent* traces Hendrie's journey through the unspoken, misunderstood world of PMDD—Premenstrual Dysphoric Disorder. A love letter to anyone who has ever felt hijacked by their hormones, misdiagnosed by the medical system, or alone in their suffering, this book is a lighthouse. Unapologetically honest and quietly revolutionary, *Where the Eff is My Red Tent* is not just a story of one woman's diagnosis—it's a call to listen to our bodies, name our truths, and reclaim space for stories we've been told to keep quiet.

SYNOPSIS

Richard "Ritchie" Nelson was born in Norway in 1899, the son of his adoptive mother's sister and a Swedish Jew. He was raised alongside his three cousins and at age ten, he persuaded his parents to immigrate to Canada's west coast to join two already established older brothers. By age thirteen, Ritchie was crafting gillnets from discards and fishing the Fraser River for salmon. Quickly mastering English and with money earned from fishing, he paid for a year of education at a Lutheran college. In 1929, he co-founded Nelson Bros. Fisheries with his brother Norman. The fishery operated from the west coast of Vancouver Island to Alaska. With endless energy and boundless bravado, Ritchie grew Nelson Bros. into a highly successful enterprise complete with a huge fleet of gillnetters, packers, reduction plants and canneries. Nelson Bros. processed millions of pounds of salmon, herring, halibut, and crab in a year. In an industry that by the 1930s was conservative and corporate, Ritchie stayed extremely close to "his" fishermen and shore workers, working tirelessly for them—a stance that earned him their loyalty, admiration, and devotion. A champion of all fishermen and cannery workers, Ritchie Nelson was honoured by the Tlingit First Nation as "Big Fin," which is an allusion to the killer whale or "the one that tells everybody else what to do." In this unique story of grit, ambition, and kindness, Macdonald delves into the history of one of BC's most successful fishing enterprises that is today thriving as a

business consultancy in the seafood industry.

BIOGRAPHY

Walter Bruce MacDonald is a historian, novelist, poet, and teacher. He was born in New Westminster, B.C. and received his BA in English Literature from the University of Victoria and his MA in Fine Arts from the University of British Columbia. In 2011, Caitlin Press published *The Good Hope Cannery: Life and Death at a Salmon Cannery*, his highly regarded Rivers Inlet history book. In 2013, Caitlin published his acclaimed history of Canadian lacrosse, *Salmonbellies vs. The World: The Story of the Most Famous Team in Lacrosse and Their Greatest Rivals*. MacDonald is also the winner of THIS Magazine's Poetry Award for Best Poem and has published numerous books of fiction.

Stuart Nelson is a grandson of Nelson Bros. Fisheries co-founder Ritchie Nelson and the son of former Nelson Bros. president Bill Nelson. The fishing industry is in Stuart's blood and after holding senior management positions at B.C. Packers he is today the principal of Nelson Bros. Fisheries Ltd, a management consulting firm offering specialized expertise to the west coast seafood industry and other businesses. Since 1998 Stuart's firm has completed over one hundred and thirty projects for clients in the private sector, government agencies, First Nations, and environmental and non-profit organizations.

In *Sublime: Poems for Vanishing Ice*, poets from across Turtle Island explore what it means to enter into conversation with ice. The poems in Yvonne Blomer's third, water-focused anthology exemplify sublime as both verb and adjective: these are poems that skate, drink, stomp, crush and dive. SYNOPSIS

In 1823, a series of violent events in northern British Columbia shattered the fragile trading relationship between the local Indigenous community and the Hudson's Bay Company (HBC). In The Fort George Murders, best-selling author and historian Geoff Mynett delves deep into the HBC's documentation about this exceptional period in BC history. Writers later in the century took the HBC stories and added invented details and imagined motivation like layers of paint and grime over an old painting. Unfortunately, there are few written records from the Indigenous point of view. With a keen and curious sensitivity, Mynett examines the records, always bearing in mind the likelihood of conscious or unconscious bias of the writers.

With the murder of two HBC workers following a situation rooted in personal relationships and complicated by tensions between the Indigenous and the settler communities, the future of New Caledonia's trading district was thrown into crisis. Mynett wades through the imperfect historical record in search of what really happened, seeking to understand this period of dangerous tension: Was the HBC to blame? Would they withdraw from New Caledonia altogether? Would they capture the murderers? And if so, what then?

Bringing to life notable figures in British Columbia's history such as Chief Kw'eh, James Murray Yale, John Tod, Sir George Simpson and Sir James Douglas, The Fort George Murders explores how simmering tensions between the HBC and Indigenous community upended a delicate trade alliance, in which many wanted to simply co-exist. In a startling account as gripping as it is uncomfortable, best-selling BC author Geoff Mynett brings us to a breaking point in Canada's fur trade.

BIOGRAPHY

Geoff Mynett was born in Shropshire, England and qualified in England as a barrister. After coming to British Columbia in 1973, he requalified and practised law in Vancouver until his retirement. His first book, *Service on the Skeena: Horace Wrinch, Frontier Physician* (Ronsdale Press, 2019), received a Jeanne Clarke Memorial Award. His recent books, *Pinkerton's and the Hunt for Simon Gunanoot, Murders on the Skeena, River of Mists, The Eventful Life of Philip Hankin,* and *A Gentleman of Considerable Talent* were published by Caitlin Press; both *Pinkerton's* and the *Hunt for Simon Gunanoot* and *Murders on the Skeena* appeared on the BC Bestseller List for eight consecutive weeks in 2021, respectively. A believer in the importance of knowing our histories, Geoff Mynett is also an amateur artist. He and his wife Alice live in Vancouver.

SYNOPSIS

Growing up in a predominantly Mormon community in Cardston, Alberta, Cathalynn Labonté-Smith was surrounded by the stories and culture of the Church of the Latter Day Saints. As an atheist teenager, she was envious of the strong bonds between the members of the Mormon community and wanted desperately to belong, especially when she fell in love with a Mormon boy. In *I'm Not a Mormon (Anymore): An Outsider's Journey in Loving & Leaving the Church*, Labonté-Smith revisits her decision to become a Mormon and how she discovered it wasn't everything she expected. She returns to the raw, sometimes awkward journals of her youth and includes firsthand accounts from former schoolmates in Cardston, including Mormons, ex-Mormons, and non-Mormons who experienced varying levels of bullying. Against this backdrop, Labonté-Smith explains her complicated relationship with the church and their rules that eventually led to her leaving Mormonism.

In this hard-hitting and honest memoir, Labonte-Smith wades through the attraction and perils of religion, discovering how it can serve as fertile ground for abuse, misogyny, and bigotry, but also kindness and forgiveness.

SYNOPSIS

Author Anna Byrne's close friend Mary Morgan spent her life looking for community. As a youth, the pain of Mary's mother's death is made more difficult by her family's silent grief, financial problems and disapproval of her identity as a lesbian. At 17, Mary leaves her troubled home in Toronto to live among the Guna peoples of Panama—an adventure that ignites four decades of social justice work in war-torn countries around the globe. Flying kites with Bedouin children, smoking with Bosnian men, and resisting the Guatemalan Civil War alongside Maya women offers Mary a powerful salve for her yearning to belong: Chosen family—communities based on mutual values and support.

When faced with a terminal diagnosis while living in a remote British Columbian town with few resources, Mary brings the heart of her life's work—the power of ordinary people to effect change—to bear on her dying. In addition to Anna, she asks two other friends—Jules, and Laurie—to be her "dying team" and help her to die at home. Over 16 months, until her death with Medical Assistance In Dying (MAID), the team embarks on a profound experiment to curate Mary's vision of a death steeped in beauty, ceremony, and practical support through building a casket, hosting a home vigil, and transporting her body for a green burial. The journey to bring tenderness and creativity to one person's suffering emerges as an antidote to the urgency, scarcity, and loneliness that seek to define our lives—and deaths. Anna Byrne's *The Last Caravan* offers a new paradigm for deathcare by returning it to the hands of the community.

BIOGRAPHY

A cancer diagnosis at age 32 shaped **Anna Byrne's** understanding of dying. As a catalyst for human connection, it also led to over a decade of work as an end-of-life educator, speaker and author. Her memoir, *Seven Year Summer*—a finalist in the Whistsler Independent Book Awards—is used as a training tool in hospices; her writing has also appeared in qathet Living, Young Adult Cancer Canada, and *Feminism and Religion: How Faiths View Women and Their Rights* (Praeger, 2021). Byrne holds degrees in Gerontology, Psychology, Education, and Theology, with a thesis on Medical Assistance in Dying. She delivers keynotes, workshops, and training for organizations such as the Canadian Cancer Society, the BC Hospice Palliative Care Association, and Vancouver Island University. She lives in qathet, British Columbia, on the traditional territory of the Tla'amin Nation, where she coordinates services for a hospice society and co-founded Community-Supported Dying qathet, an initiative to equip communities to care for those who are aging, ill or grieving.

She is a site-sensitive poetic-renegade and multi-disciplinary, community-engaged arts practitioner. She holds a PhD in Performance, along with a MA and BFA in Applied Theatre. She has taught and performed internationally. Her publications range from place-based children's books, articles to artistic academic chapters. She is the author of *knee deep in high water: riding the Muskwa-Kechika*, expedition poems (Caitlin Press, 2023); *Sea to Sky Alphabet* (Simply Read Books, 2024); *Gulf Islands Alphabet* (Simply Read Books, 2012) and the forthcoming *Olive and Jasper, Canadian Rockies Alphabet* and *My Happy Hiking Trails*, all with Simply Read Books.
