

ANNIE POOTOOGOOK: LIFE & WORK

Annie Pootoogook was the first Inuk to win the prestigious Sobey Art Award and to participate in renowned international exhibitions, such as documenta in Kassel, Germany. Her courageous drawings stand at the precipice of a shift in production and reception of Northern art, and they remain an inspiration for new generations of Inuit artists. Annie Pootoogook is revered as being one of Cape Dorset's most pioneering contemporary graphic artists, drawing on her personal experiences to challenge Southern perceptions of life in the North.

Cape Dorset-born Annie Pootoogook (1969–2016) explored, celebrated, and depicted her northern community in unprecedented ways. Pootoogook belonged to a family of famed Inuit artists that included her parents, Eegyvudluk and Napachie Pootoogook, and her grandmother, the celebrated Pitseolak Ashoona. In 1997 Pootoogook started working at the West Baffin Eskimo Co-operative's Kinngait Studios, where she produced detailed and descriptive drawings in ink and crayon.

In addition to representing scenes of everyday life in the North—including people watching TV, playing cards, shopping, or cooking dinner—Pootoogook created works about such difficult subjects as alcoholism, domestic abuse, food scarcity, and the effects of intergenerational trauma. Pootoogook's compelling drawings resulted in her national and international recognition.


