



The Sky and the PatioBy (author) Don Gayton

In 22 engaging essays, Summerland writer Don Gayton fuses the personal with the ecological to portray the geography and the natural and human history of his adopted Okanagan Valley homeland.

Draft resister and professional ecologist by training, Don Gayton registers the complexity and interconnectedness of every living thing in his environment, from the rivers and lakes, to the plants and animals, and the human settlements along the Okanagan, Similkameen, and Columbia watercourses shaping his backyard.


The Sky and the Patio describes the patterns made by iconic native species such as ponderosa pine, sagebrush and bunchgrass, the sockeye salmon and turtles, and the non-natives reshaping their world: the toadflax and knapweed, antelopebrush, horses and cattle --- and the grapevines, tomatoes and cannabis looking for a foothold today.

Gayton tells us what we can learn from tree rings besides the tree's age; some fine points about firewood; and a little bit about Chinook wawa, and his own library of nature writing.

Contributor Bio

The author of four previous books --- *The Wheatgrass Mechanism* (1990), *Landscapes of the Interior* (1996), *Kokanee: The Redfish and the Kootenay Bioregion* (2002) and *Interwoven Wild: An Ecologist Loose in the Garden* (2007) --- Gayton's career, spanning five decades, includes working for the BC Ministry of Forests and Range, the Saskatchewan Department of Agriculture, the BC Ministry of Environment, the Lower Similkameen Indian Band, as well as numerous local governments and community organizations. He lives in Summerland, BC.

20th Anniversary Edition

It's 1978 and a non-stop carnival of debauchery begins as the first shock of punk hits Vancouver. Now, in 2022, revisit John Armstrong's pivotal memoir in the 20th anniversary edition of *Guilty of Everything*.

As Buck Cherry – lead singer and guitarist of The Modernettes – Armstrong had himself a front row seat to the frenzy of the 70s and 80s alongside the likes of I Braineater, Joey Shithead, Dimwit, Chuck Biscuits, Mary Jo Kopechne, Art Bergmann and other figures of Vancouver's earliest punk days. From White Rock to Vancouver, the back rooms and alleys of the Smilin' Buddha to the Commodore Ballroom, *Guilty of Everything* recounts the drug-addled, booze-soaked days and nights of this anarchic era, brought to life once again by Armstrong's candid and compelling prose.

Contributor Bio

John Armstrong is an award-winning journalist, writer and musician. He is the author of three books, *Guilty of Everything* (shortlisted for the BC Book Prize), *Wages*, and *A Series of Dogs* (longlisted for the Leacock Medal for Humour). After his early days as frontman Buck Cherry of The Modernettes, Armstrong began a 15-year long career as a journalist with the *Vancouver Sun*. He now lives with his family and dogs in Chilliwack, BC.



Gongo Dodan

Gustave Morin has spent a life carving out a bold and courageous body of work that questions and expands the definition of poetry. The vision and the range of his work, including the books *Clean Sails* (2015), *The Etcetera Barbecue* (2008), and *A Penny Dreadful* (2003), show him as one of the more accomplished literary innovators in our age, committed as he is to the opposite of whatever the official culture endorses.


His new book *Gongo Dodan* is comprised of sixty-two unusual poems, of course. Gustave Morin's poems have never played by the rules, opting instead to playing for keeps, gleefully channelling those cosmic and eternal verities that have long been associated with both the written word and the colossal image.

Gongo Dodan is the result of a lifetime of absorbed aesthetic philosophy shot through many critical social commentaries, all of which serve to illustrate how an amalgamation of a knowledge of the arts, when applied to the art of writing artfully, can come to inhabit one word pushed beyond its own inevitable plasticity - poetry.

Contributor Bio

Gustave Morin's previous New Star title, *Clean Sails* (2015) is the world's largest volume of typewriter poetry. The *Etcetera Barbecue* was published in 2006 by BookFug. His 2003 title, *A Penny Dreadful*, one of the few collage novels ever to appear in Canada, is now scarce. Gustave Morin has also produced twelve short-run books and chapbooks. He lives with his gals, Jenny and Nova, in a small mid-western city on the edge of The Canada.

After Villon

After Villon, the new book from Dorothy Livesay Poetry Prize finalist Roger Farr, is a book of contemporary verse translations and “queer variations” based on the work of 15th century *poete maudit* Francois Villon.

Villon’s poetry, written in medieval French and incorporating the argot of the Parisian criminal underworld, is notoriously bawdy, opaque, and resistant to “straightforward” translation. For this reason, Villon’s work continues to be of considerable interest to poets, artists, and scholars working today.


After Villon is informed by previous ventures into Villon’s work by Ezra Pound (who invented a new poetic form, the *villonaud*), Basil Bunting, William Carlos Williams, and, especially, Jack Spicer, who similarly “translated” Lorca in his influential *After Lorca* (1957) and Jean Calais (Stephen Rodefer), whose chauvinist / “beatnik” version of the poet stepped forward in *Villon* (1987).

Roger Farr’s new re-workings capture the in-group opacity in Villon’s work by mingling slangs from a variety of discourses and sites, everything from prison, theatre, culinary, military, to carnie slang. In his translations, Farr subverts sex and gender designations by shifting pronouns, changing names, and refusing heteronormative assumptions about the copious “gaps” in meaning of the original texts.

Gabriola Island, BC resident Roger Farr is the author of three previous books of poetry: the long poem *I Am a City Still But Soon I Shan’t Be* (2019); *IKMQ* (2011; finalist for the Dorothy Livesay Poetry Prize); and *Surplus* (2010). He teaches contemporary literature at Capilano University in North Vancouver, and is currently editing a volume of translations of the French anarchist philosopher Emile Armand.

MiskwagoodeBy (author) Marie Annharte Baker

Taken from the Anishinaabe for “woman wearing red,” *Miskwagoode* is an unsettling portrayal of unreconciled Indigenous experience under colonialism, past and present.

Miskwagoode, the woman in the red dress, is Annharte, and she is Annharte's mother, who disappeared when the poet was a girl. *Miskwagoode* is Annharte's new book about her mother loss, her “mothermiss”, about all the women “buried in common enough / cross-generational graves”.

Marked with her characteristic sharp eye and humour, and hard earned wisdom about the “ominous progress ahead”, Annharte's fifth collection encompasses the poet's experiences as an Anishinaabe Elder, “witness not survivor”, writing of the weight of a present and persisting colonialism.

In her sly, cheeky riffs on life behind the “buckskin curtain” at the margins of settler society, Annharte tells us about granny circles, the horny old guys, and getting your hair done. But these poems about rez life and the community and belonging it offers are set against the background radiation of the poverty and the sicknesses, despair, violence, sexism, and sexual abuse, the legacies of unequal relations.


Miskwagoode concludes with “Wabang,” a suite of short poems comprising Annharte's own thumbnail transcontinental Indigenous mythology.

Annharte (Marie Baker) is Anishinaabe (Little Saskatchewan First Nation, Manitoba). She is the author of four previous books of poetry: *Being On the Moon* (1990), *Columbus Coyote Cafe* (1995), *Exercises in Lip Pointing* (2003), and *Indigena Awry* (2013). Her book of essays, *a/k/a*, was published in 2012 by Capilano University Editions. She lives in Gypsumville, Manitoba.

Bird Arsonist

Written with four hands, by Tom Prime and the Giller Prize and Governor General's Award shortlisted Gary Barwin, *Bird Arsonist* is avant-garde, tragicomic poetry at its most arresting.

They say the language of birds is the closest to that of the divine. They also say poetry is the unacknowledged legislator of the world. In *Bird Arsonist*, Tom Prime and Gary Barwin — like all good avant-gardists — flip these commonplaces on their heads, showing that poetry sets alight any transparent, easy, lawful language, or is precisely what language spits out as it turns to ash.


Compressed to the point of implosion, the poems that make up this volume are contorted descendants of Dadaism, Surrealism, and every other -ism. Prime and Barwin confront poetry's contemporary preference for confession and today's digitization of reality not only by — as they are two — using a doubled “I,” but also by letting language elide the human-all-too-human hand of authorship *tout court*. The author of *Bird Arsonist* is language itself, sonorous and fragmentary. Prime and Barwin have merely done the job of giving it the room to speak, of keeping it infected, of making visible the outline of its splinters and its cuts. Shake gently!

Contributor Bio

Tom Prime is the author and co-author (with Gary Barwin) of several poetry chapbooks. His debut solo collection, *Mouthfuls of Space*, is scheduled for publication in the fall of 2021, with Anvil Press. His writing has appeared in *Brave New World*, *Carousel*, *Ditch*, *Fjords Review*, *The Rusty Toque*, *Lana Turner*, *Vallum*, and *Watch Your Head*, among others. He currently lives in London, Ontario, where he is completing his PhD in English at the University of Western Ontario.

Gary Barwin is a writer, composer, musician, and multidisciplinary artist and has published 25 books of fiction, poetry, and numerous chapbooks. His latest books include *For It Is a Pleasure and a Surprise to Breathe*, ed. Alessandro Porco, and *Nothing the Same, Everything Haunted: The Ballad of Motl the Cowboy*. His national bestselling novel, *Yiddish for Pirates*, won the Stephen Leacock Award for Humour and the Canadian Jewish Literary Award and was also a finalist for both the Governor General's Award for Fiction and the Scotiabank Giller Prize. He lives in Hamilton, Ontario, and at garybarwin.com.

A spirited, far-sighted guide to politics, Star Wars, the Avengers, David Lynch, and the lost highways between them, for today's capitalist-realist age.

"We've met before, haven't we?" The grand illusion of our era is that we're at the end of history and cinema is now no more than tranquilizing entertainment. What we've lost sight of is the political undercurrent running through movies and their potentially redemptive power, whether they're Hollywood mega blockbusters like *Star Wars* or off-kilter indies and art films like *Blue Velvet*.


This is the premise and the challenge of the wide-ranging essays that make up ***Screen Captures***, in which Dennis Hopper, Nicholas Cage, Valerie Solanas, and even Donald Trump all have a starring role. The book tells, as much as it shows, what lies just out of frame: the impacts of COVID on theatres, the class war of the 1% upon the rest, the climate crisis, the ongoing Disney-fication of franchises, and the audience's active participation in the rewriting and reproduction of their capture by screens. Throughout, subliminally, Stephen Lee Naish rings his urgent call: occupy the screen!

Fleeing communist Budapest by air balloon, a wrestler tries to reinvent himself in Canada.
